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
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

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Lakers 'Slam the Door' in D4



he motto last postseason for the Maple City Glen Lake girls basketball team was "Slam the door." But at halftime of the 2023 MHSAA Division 4 Final against Baraga, the Lakers still had to find their own way through it.

Thanks to suffocating second-half defense and the inside-outside combination of seniors Ruby Hogan and Maddie Bradford, Glen Lake ran through and slammed the door on a 60-43 win, claiming its first Finals title since 1978.

"We knew we had to come out in the second half like we had in the past few games and just take it to them and be focused," Hogan said. "Work on our offense, work on our defense and don't foul them. Then things would come our way. Our motto for the postseason has been 'Slam the door' and we definitely have been a second-half team this postseason. Today we proved that again."

Hogan had 19 points, seven rebounds and five assists for the Lakers, who were making their first Finals appearance since 1979.

"It's amazing," said Glen Lake senior guard Gemma Lerchen, who had six assists. "It's unbelievable to finally be able to get it done. It's been forever that we've worked for this. Through the summer, through the whole year. It just feels so good to get it done."

Glen Lake coach Jason Bradford, who is in his 15th season at the helm, was well aware of the program's history and the Finals drought.

His teams have had plenty of success, winning more than 280 games and stepping up their postseason success in recent years, winning Regional titles in five of the past seven seasons.

And when he woke up to hear those traveling from Glen Lake would have to brave a snowstorm to get to the Breslin Center, he became even more confident this could be the year.

"Like I said on Thursday, it seems like the stars were all lining up," he said. "It's been 45 years, and 45 years ago, there was a

snowstorm (on the day of the Final). My wife called just after 6 (a.m.) and said they were a bit behind with the snowstorm. I looked out the window and I was like, 'That's a good sign.' But it's unbelievable. We knew we were capable of doing it."

Maddie Bradford, Jason's daughter, led all scorers with 28 points. She also had eight rebounds. Eleanor Valkner added 11 rebounds.

Sixteen of those points, and 17 of Hogan's, came in the second half as the Lakers turned the tide in a game during which they trailed by five at halftime.

"I just focused on, if I'm not open and not able to hit those shots, I trust my team," Hogan said. "That's what I need to do and that's what all of us need to do, is trust each other."

The first half was the time for Baraga star guard Corina Jahfetson to hit shots, as she scored 14 of her 20 points in the opening 16 minutes, including four 3-pointers. Glen Lake held her to six points and 2 of 15 shooting, including 1 of 12 from 3, in the second half.


As a team, Baraga struggled from the field in the second half as Glen Lake's defense improved. The Vikings (23-6) were 4 of 22 from the field in the second half, and went scoreless for more than 5 minutes at one point in the third quarter.

Makenna Hendrickson had 14 points for Baraga, while Jahfetson added seven rebounds to her 20 points in Baraga's first Finals appearance.

"It means so much to be here sitting with these girls and coach Ty," Jahfetson said. "I'm happy that we're state runner-up. It would have been amazing to be No. 1, but not everything works out that way."

2023 Finals Review



DIVISION 1 Rockford 40, West Bloomfield 36

Brad Wilson had preached to his Rockford girls basketball team the importance of focusing on the next play. Apparently, he did a good job of drilling it home.

After hitting the biggest shot in program history and giving the Rams a final-minute lead in the 2023 MHSAA Division 1 Final against West Bloomfield, junior guard Grace Lyons' mind immediately went to heeding her coaches instructions.

"It was amazing, but I knew we had to get back on defense and finish it out," Lyons said.

Lyons and her Rockford teammates did finish it out, making her go-ahead 3-pointer with 40 seconds remaining the deciding bucket in a 40-36 win to capture the first Finals title in program history.


"Greatness is about the journey – it's about the effort that gets put in each and every day," Wilson said. "In my opinion, these girls were great before we even played this game."

The win avenged a Semifinal loss from a year ago, when the Lakers ended Rockford's first trip to the Final Four.

Both offenses struggled to get anything going against the other's stellar defense, and the teams headed into the fourth quarter with West Bloomfield leading 23-22.

West Bloomfield led 36-35 with under 2 minutes to play, but Lyons came up with a steal with 1:12 remaining. Not long after, she found herself open near the top of the 3-point line and didn't hesitate to let a shot fly, giving Rockford a 38-36 lead with 40 seconds to play. It was her first basket of the day.

DIVISION 2 Lansing Catholic 43, Frankenmuth 29

The Lansing Catholic girls basketball team took a short drive to end a long wait.

Playing just three miles from their high school, the Cougars defeated Frankenmuth 43-29 to win the 2023 MHSAA Division 2 Final. It was the first Finals title for the program since 1995.

"It felt like homecourt advantage a little bit," Lansing Catholic senior guard Hannah Pricco said. "Our bus trip wasn't super long. It just kind of felt like we were coming to our own court."

The Cougars treated it that way, dominating from the beginning of the matchup in their first Finals trip since that 1995 title. They scored the game's first 11 points and never looked back.

"This is, as you can imagine, extremely surreal," Lansing Catholic coach Kacee Reid said. "You're going through literally every emotion on the bench, especially in a game like that. Frankenmuth is making such a great comeback, and we knew they were going to fight to the end."

Lansing Catholic (24-5) never trailed, and led by as many as 17 points in the third quarter. Leah Richards led the Cougars with 16 points and nine rebounds, while Anna Richards had 14 points. Gabby Halliwill added seven.

Frankenmuth (25-3) didn't go away, despite trailing by double digits for the majority of the game.

The Eagles cut the lead to seven with 2:45 to play on a steal and layup from Clare Conzelmann, but never got closer.

DIVISION 3 Hemlock 59, Blissfield 43

As Regan Finkbeiner exited the court during the final seconds of Hemlock's 2023 MHSAA Division 3 Final triumph, she was hit with a mix of emotions.

The senior guard let the happy one take over, screaming in celebration to the Huskies student section, which screamed back in acknowledgement.

"I didn't know if I was crying happy tears or sad tears because I'm done with basketball after this," Finkbeiner said. "I was crying because I was happy, crying because I was sad."

Finkbeiner had a game-high 19 points to lead Hemlock to a 59-43 win against Blissfield. It was the first girls basketball title for the Huskies, who were making their first appearance in the Finals.

."It's kind of surreal," Hemlock coach Scott Neumeyer said. "I'm just so proud of this team, especially the seniors. I was really happy for how they approached this whole tournament run."

TheHuskies forced 17 turnovers while committing just six. They were 22 of 25 from the free throw line, including 15 of 17 in the fourth quarter to salt the game away.

Much of that came from senior guard Chloe Watson, who hit 11 of her 13 free throw attempts in the game, on her way to 18 points.

Watson and Finkbeiner also were able to dribble away much of the fourth quarter as Blissfield was chasing a double-digit deficit.

Lauren Borsenik added 16 points and seven rebounds for the Huskies.

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Jacques Tabbed for Forsythe Award

Serving as athletic director at Michigan's northernmost high school, Calumet's **Sean Jacques** has impacted student-athletes not only in his community, but across the Upper Peninsula and all the way to the state's southern borders as a member of the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Representative Council. To recognize his far-reaching contributions across several leadership roles, Jacques has been selected as the 2024 honoree for the MHSAA's Charles E. Forsythe Lifetime Achievement Award.

The annual award is in its 47th year and named after former MHSAA Executive Director Charles E. Forsythe, the Association's first full-time and longest-serving chief executive. Forsythe Award recipients are selected each year by the MHSAA Representative Council, based on an individual's outstanding contributions to the interscholastic athletics community at the local, regional and statewide levels. Jacques will be honored during the MHSAA Girls Basketball Finals this weekend.

A 1985 graduate of Calumet, Jacques taught for one year at Lansing Everett before returning to his alma mater in 1992, when he began teaching primarily technology and metal shop until becoming the athletic director and an assistant principal in 2008. He served in those administrative roles through the end of the 2021-22 school year and currently is an instructor for the Calumet-Laurium-Keweenaw school district's Upper Peninsula Virtual Academy.

During his tenure as athletic director, Calumet added junior varsity hockev, junior varsity and varsity softball,

and varsity baseball, bowling and gymnastics teams. He led facility upgrades including the addition of a turf football field, new locker rooms and an additional gymnasium, creating a home not only for Copper Kings athletes and coaches but for those from all over the northern UP as Calumet is a frequent host of MHSAA District and Regional events plus Coaching Advancement Program (CAP) sessions.

Also under his direction, Calumet became the first Upper Peninsula school to join the MHSAA School Broadcast Program, and he created the high school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2012. In 2016, Calumet became the only Upper Peninsula school to earn the prestigious Michigan Exemplary Athletic Program honor from the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA).

"When I became athletic director, my goal was number one, we were going to run a classy program. We were going to do it right. We weren't going to be lazy about anything, not take the easy road. I wanted to do right for the kids, the school district and the community," Jacques said. "We went after a lot of different things. It's very cliché, but we really did try to put kids first. Every decision we made, we always tried to make decisions with that in mind – what's best for the kids – and worked hard to be innovative and try to run a quality, classy program."

His impact hardly has been contained to the Keweenaw Peninsula. He served as president of both the Keweenaw Area Athletic Directors group and Upper Peninsula Athletic Directors Association from 2014-22, in addition to serving as commissioner for the Western Peninsula Athletic Conference from 2012-22 and the Great Lakes Hockey Conference from 2009-22. He began his tenure on the Upper Peninsula Athletic Committee in 2014, when he also was first elected to the MHSAA Representative Council as the delegate for Class C and D schools in the Upper Peninsula. He is serving on the MHSAA's Audit and Finance Committee currently, and will conclude his tenure on Council in December.

Jacques also served as an MIAAA regional representative for more than a decade and was named Regional Athletic Director of the Year by the MIAAA in 2013 and 2016. The Upper Peninsula Athletic Directors Association named him its Upper Peninsula Athletic Director of the Year in 2019.

Jacques also currently is among eight mentors to new athletic administrators across the state as part of the MHSAA's first-year AD Connection Program. In this role, Jacques directly works with 16 recently-hired athletic directors as they navigate the job's many and various responsibilities.

"Sean Jacques brings knowledge of so many aspects of school sports, not only the work done day-to-day as an athletic director but as an innovator who developed an athletic department recognized and respected across the state," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "His community, the Upper Peninsula and Michigan as a whole continue to benefit from his dedication and leadership – and we're fortunate he's sharing that expertise with the next generation of athletic directors as part of our mentorship program."

Jacques has contributed nearly as significantly on the field of play. He has been an MHSAA registered official for 35 years, in hockey for the entirety and adding track & field in 1994-95 and cross country in 2009-10. He officiated at the MHSAA Hockey Finals in 2016 and has served as a board member for the Copper Country Hockey Officials Association, including as its scheduler for 14 years. He has 40 years as a registered official with USA Hockey, serving as officiating supervisor for the Michigan Amateur Hockey Association (MAHA) for 20 years and as Michigan's referee-in-chief from 2006-15, and he was a member of USA Hockey's national instructor staff from 1997-2019. An accomplished college official as well, he worked in that capacity for more than 25 seasons, including 15 at the Division I level in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) and Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA).

His time at Calumet has included stepping into many more roles to help provide student-athletes with the fullest possible experience. He served as public address announcer for football for 16 seasons and Calumet hockey for more than a decade. He also lent his voice to radio broadcasts for Calumet volleyball and coached freshman football at the school for two seasons.

Jacques has served on the boards for the Calumet Hockey Association, Calumet All-Sports Booster Club and Calumet High School Band Parents Club, the latter two as treasurer. He remains president of the Hall of Fame board.

"I'm a Calumet grad, and when you're the athletic director at the school you're from, I think it's something a little bit different," Jacques said. "You bleed the school colors and put that extra effort in because it's home."

Jacques played football as a student at Calumet and served as the hockey team's student equipment manager as a senior. He earned a bachelor's degree in industrial education in 1989 from Northern Michigan University, and then a master's in educational administration from NMU in 2000. He received his certified master athletic administrator (CMAA) designation in 2020 from the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) – becoming the only Upper Peninsula athletic director to achieve that accomplishment.

Jacques also has served his community as a volunteer firefighter since 1991 and as assistant fire chief since 1998.



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School Spirit is Defining Difference in HS Sports

As Education-based sports in our nation's schools are different than any other level of competition.

Youth leagues and club sports often require significant entry fees, and in many cases, the focus is on competitive success with little concern for skill development, team building or sportsmanship.

High-profile college sports have been disrupted by issues concerning media contracts, NIL and the transfer portal, with the environment a bit like the "Wild West" on campuses throughout the country.

Professional sports, of course, are about the most elite performance, entertainment and winning championships.

Sports in our nation's 19,800-plus high schools instead are much more focused on education, relationships, team unity, having fun and school spirit.

School spirit is perhaps the defining difference between interscholastic and other levels of sports – having pride in one's school, maintaining a connection to the school and coaches for life, supporting all school teams and programs whether a participant or a fan, and contributing to the bond between school and community.

On an individual basis, pride is a key component of school spirit. Students who become involved in sports take pride in their teams and school and tend to carry that pride to their future careers after high school.

High school sports have the potential to boost the spirit of communities as well. There are countless examples every year but one such community was the small town of Fertile, Minnesota, located about 270 miles northwest of Minneapolis. In 2021, Jude Olson, a junior on the Fertile-Beltrami High School nine-player football team, was killed in an accident, which shook the approximately 1,000 residents of Fertile.

Last year, however, the Fertile-Beltrami football team provided a positive boost to the town with an undefeated regular season and a first-ever trip to the Minnesota State High School League Nine-player State Football Championship at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis.

According to an article in the Grand Forks (North Dakota) Herald, many of the town's residents did not have the means to make the five-hour trek to the game. As a result, local businesses and farmers donated \$25,000 for five charter buses to make sure every fan who wanted to make the trip had a free ride to the game.

"It means a lot to the whole town," said Jodie Strem, the co-owner of Fertile Oil Company. "We want (the players) to look in the stands and see us and know we are there for them. We are coming down full force."

While the Fertile-Beltrami Falcons lost to LeRoy-Ostrander in the MSHSL Nine-player Championship, the players and the 274 fans who made the journey will remember much more than the outcome of the game. This is school spirit at its core and why high school sports are different.

High school activity programs boost the spirit of individuals, teams and communities. Research indicated that in 2020 when these programs were shut down because of the pandemic, the mental health of students was drastically compromised.

In the post-pandemic world, there are fewer face-to-face meetings. High school activities have played a major role in bringing people back together. We know that when schools have strong school spirit, communities respond with support and increased attendance.

School spirit and sportsmanship go hand in hand. If school spirit is channeled in a positive way, and expectations for good sportsmanship are communicated

and enforced by school administrators, positive fan experiences will occur.

A survey several years ago by Varsity Brands concluded that high school students with school spirit performed better academically, were more engaged in social and civic matters, and were happier in general than their less-spirited peers.

The survey indicated that the benefits of school spirit are not just confined to the school years. The study suggested that school spirit can have lasting effects, including higher aspirations for continuing education and greater success in later life.

We are pleased to report that Varsity has commissioned a new research study, which will examine the post-pandemic educational landscape and attempt to understand how the return to in-person schooling has influenced school spirit and its profound impact on student learning, leadership and personal growth. We look forward to sharing the results of this survey down the road.

As the calendar turns to 2024, it is a great opportunity to renew commitments to these programs that involve more than 12 million participants in sports and performing arts – programs that foster and celebrate school spirit.

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Scholar-Athlete Class of 2024

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 35 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2023-24 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2024-25 school year. This year, a total of 1,607 applications from 445 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.

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Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

light student-athletes who • will be juniors at their schools during the 2023-24 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of Association championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-tobe appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2023-24 were: Cale Bell, Sault Ste. Marie; Drew Cady, Oxford; Macy Jenkins, Milford; Isaiah Kabban, Harbor Beach; Ella Knudsen, Leland; Kaylee Kranz, Clinton; Joey Spada, Kalamazoo Central; and Anna Zoet, Grandville Calvin Christian.

Those eight new members were selected from 105 applicants. That number of applicants was the fourth-most ever, with the last four years featuring the four highest totals.

The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class, members will have represented 137 schools from 50 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 16 MHSAA sports, and all eight will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

MHSAA Representative Council

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, nonpublic schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.

Cicerone, Claar 2024 WISL Winners

n the basketball court, no woman in Michigan high school history has led her team to more victories than Bloomfield Hills Marian's Mary Cicerone. And few schools have stacked more championships over the last decade than Ann Arbor Pioneer under the guidance of athletic director Eve Claar.

To celebrate those accomplishments, and more significantly their impacts on thousands of students over decades in those leadership positions, Cicerone and Claar are the 37th and 38th recipients of the MHSAA's Women In Sports Leadership Award.

Each year, the Representative Council considers the achievements of women coaches, officials and athletic administrators affiliated with the MHSAA who show exemplary leadership capabilities and positive contributions to athletics. Cicerone and Claar received their awards during the WISL Conference, Feb. 4-5 at the Crowne Plaza Lansing West.



Cicerone retired from coaching the Bloomfield Hills Marian girls basketball team after the 2021-22 season with a record of 707-233 since taking over the program in 1983 – making her the fourth-winningest coach in MHSAA girls basketball history, and the winningest woman to lead a program.

She guided the Mustangs to six Finals championships, in Class A in 1988, 1992, 1996 and 1998 and back-to-back in Division 1 in 2014 and 2015. Her teams also won 19

Catholic High School League Central division championships, 20 overall CHSL League titles and reached the MHSAA Semifinals seven times, also finishing Class A runner-up in 1997.

"Mary Cicerone is a legend because she's won hundreds of games and many championships, and those measurables of her success speak for themselves," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "But her commitment to her teams, her sport, and leadership in women's athletics as a whole contributed just as significantly to her tremendous legacy."

In addition to receiving several local and statewide coaching awards over the years, Cicerone has been inducted into Halls of Fame by the University of Detroit Mercy (2007) as a player and as a coach by the Catholic High School League (1998), Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan (2017) and Marian (2022).

"Being a young girl wanting to play all kinds of activities, we never had much opportunity and I participated in whatever I was able and just felt like that was something that was important to me, my friends and everybody I was associated with was always part of the same group," Cicerone said. "I felt like (advocating for women's sports) was something I should do because it was so important for me, and I appreciated everything everybody did for me and my friends to be able to play."



Claar is in her 21st year as an athletic director, and over the last decade has guided one of the state's largest athletic programs in terms of both programs and student-athletes, with 36 varsity teams and nearly 1,110 participants. The Pioneers have had ample local and statewide success during her tenure, including claiming 16 MHSAA Finals championships across seven sports over the last eight school years. Claar began in athletic administration as Pioneer's assistant director from 2003-06, and she

became athletic director at Bloomfield Hills Lahser at the start of the 2006-07 school year. She took over the program at Ypsilanti Lincoln as athletic director in 2009 before returning to Pioneer in



2012.

"Eve Claar continues to show the way for her programs to succeed on the field while keeping in mind the big picture of what's important in school sports," Uyl said. "She's invested in providing the best experiences for Pioneer's student-athletes, and athletes competing throughout the Southeastern Conference, while also providing support to AD colleagues and coaches who look to her for leadership and expertise."

Claar has served as the Southeastern Conference secretary since 2009 and is the league's sport director for softball and field hockey. She has been president of the Michigan Field Hockey League since 2018 and has served on several MHSAA sport and site selection committees and as part of the MHSAA/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award selection committee. Before becoming an athletic director, Claar worked five years in the Detroit Pistons/Detroit Shock community relations department.

She was named a Regional Athletic Director of the Year in 2019 by the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAA). In 2021, she helped found the Southeastern Conference's Women in Sports Leadership Conference for student-athletes from the league's 14 schools.

"I started with (longtime Pioneer AD) Lorin Cartwright before me, and she was always a mentor for me. I've always had female leaders and mentors whether in sports for high school, over to Pioneer, with the Shock with Nancy Lieberman – I've been around amazing female leaders," Claar said. "I feel at this point, 21 years into doing this, now it's upon me to do the same. I've been honored when I've had other athletic directors reach out, other female ADs ask for support, and I've been able to give the support my mentors gave me."

Cicerone is a 1978 graduate of Coopersville High School, where she was a basketball all-stater and ran track, and she then starred on the basketball court at Detroit Mercy, leading the Titans to three Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) state titles and graduating as Mercy's all-time career assists leader while earning a bachelor's degree in education. She won the 1982 President's Award as U-D's most outstanding female student-athlete. She taught primarily physical education at Marian beginning with the 1983-84 school year through her retirement 39 years later.

Claar is a 1991 graduate of North Farmington High School and earned her bachelor's degree in business administration from Central Michigan University and master's from Detroit Mercy. Claar played basketball, volleyball and softball at North Farmington and was a BCAM Miss Basketball Award finalist in 1990. She continued as a standout at CMU, where she remains among the most accomplished 3-point shooters in program history. She also served as a graduate assistant women's basketball coach at U-D for two seasons.





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
